The historic Lilacs Cabin was hand-built by craftsmen back in 1924 & was once part of the Bailey's Resort. The original Bailey family homestead of 1888 was the center of Palomar town-ship life with a post office, soda fountain, dance hall, general store, stage coach station & hotel. The Bailey's Resort grew from these beginnings. City dwellers, like the Native Americans before them, wanted to get away from the summer heat or enjoy the cool mountains. As a result, by the early 1920s the Baileys set up recreational summer tent camps & later began to build a few handcrafted guest cabins; the Lilacs cabin was built for grandma. Palomar's Native American historical background: The Luiseños, the indigenous Native Americans, called this special mountain *Wavamai*. The Spanish arrived in 1798 to establish Mission San Luis Rey <http://www.sanluisrey.org/>; they named the mountain "Palomar", for the thousands of Band Tailed Rock Pigeons; Palomas in Spanish. The area where the Lilacs Cabin and Bailey Meadows sit today was the site of a seasonal villages called *Paisvi* by the Luiseños Indians who hunted and gathered acorns on Palomar Mountain. I highly recommend visiting the Native American Oak Grove, just 5 minutes from the Lilacs cabin – at the parking lot just beyond the entrance to the Palomar Mt. State Park. It is very special! Perched next to an awesome overlook under huge oak trees, there is an array of deep, well-worn bedrock mortars and "metates" which testify to the centuries of established Luiseño Indian settlements. Make every effort to visit the Palomar Mountain State Park and hike one of the fabulous (often easy) trails. You will

not regret it! With over 1,897 acres protected for picnic, fishing and camping purposes, Palomar Mountain State Park with elevations topping out at 5500 feet is a welcome break from busy San Diego city life. Palomar Mountain SP features a thick coniferous forest and spectacular views of the Pacific Ocean. This is one of the few southern California areas with a Sierra Nevada-like atmosphere. The park offers fishing. Scenic Doanes Pond is stocked with trout, with bluegill and catfish as the common catch. The park offers thick forests with spruce, cedar, oak and pine trees. Lupine and buttercups bloom on-site. Squirrels and raccoons are some of the wildlife at the park. With a day use fee of \$6*?, all of these park wonders are available to you.

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park: If you are not from here, go to experience the desert. Anza-Borrego Desert State Park is the largest state park in California. Five hundred miles of dirt roads, 12 wilderness areas and miles of hiking trails provide visitors with an unparalleled opportunity to experience the wonders of the Colorado Desert.

Cuyamaca Rancho State Park: The beautiful park offers camping and hiking in an oak woodland forest, with a sprinkling of pines and lovely meadows with creeks. There are over 100 miles of trails, which accommodate hikers, bikers, and equestrians. The day use area offers sets of cascades and shallow pools, great for water play on hot days .
